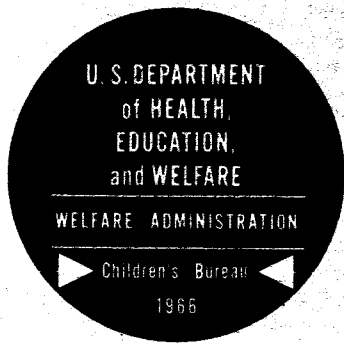


**PROJECTS FUNDED
UNDER THE
CHILD WELFARE
RESEARCH AND DEMONSTRATION
GRANTS PROGRAM**



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DISCRIMINATION PROHIBITED--Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 states: "No person in the United States shall, on the ground of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subject to discrimination under any program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance." Therefore, the Children's Bureau's programs, like every program or activity receiving financial assistance from the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, must be operated in compliance with this law.

**PROJECTS FUNDED
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The Child Welfare Research and Demonstration Grants Program was authorized by the Social Security Amendments of 1960 enacted by the 86th Congress. The purpose of the grants program is indicated in the authorizing legislation:

"There are hereby authorized to be appropriated for each fiscal year such sums as the Congress may determine for grants by the Secretary to public or other nonprofit institutions of higher learning, and to public or other nonprofit agencies and organizations engaged in research or child-welfare activities, for special research or demonstration projects in the field of child welfare which are of regional or national significance and for special projects for the demonstration of new methods or facilities which show promise of substantial contribution to the advancement of child welfare"

Applications for grants are reviewed by appropriate members of the staff of the Children's Bureau, by non-Governmental experts who serve as a panel of correspondents, and by an Advisory Group of non-Governmental experts, which makes recommendations on applications to the Chief of the Children's Bureau. The Chief is vested with authority to make final decisions in regard to approval of applications. Primary factors considered in evaluating an application are: the contribution the project will make to the field of child welfare, the soundness of the project design, the adequacy of resources to conduct the proposed research or demonstration, the relationship of the project to comparable projects already completed or in process, and the regional or national significance of the results to be obtained. To assure that a maximum number of projects are supported by available Federal funds, it is required that each applicant finance as large a part of the project cost as possible.

The projects financed by the program encompass a wide range of studies or demonstrations conducted by institutions of higher learning, public and voluntary agencies, and child welfare services organizations. Grants have been made to support research or demonstrations in such areas as: protective services for neglected and abused children; adoption; foster care; services for

mentally retarded children; child welfare services in urban or rural areas; manpower utilization and training; day care services; services for unmarried mothers.

Universities and institutions of higher learning have received the largest proportion of grant awards as a result of an innovation begun in 1964 in funding programmatic research grants. The major components of programmatic research grants are: (1) a projected cluster of related projects around a common research theme; (2) common leadership in either one person or a team; (3) enduring presence of a nuclear staff; (4) funding of operations for an appreciable period of time; (5) continuing interest in the selected theme.

Fiscal year 1965 completed the fourth year of operation of this grants program. Since its inception, a total of 147 grants have been awarded to finance 76 projects. The Federal portion of support for the projects was \$5,388,584. The Federal appropriation for 1966 is \$3,000,000. Of the 384 applications submitted to the program as of June 30, 1965, 38 percent were approved for support.

The following tables list projects funded under the grants program. The project directors listed are those indicated on grant application forms, excepting when subsequent information was provided.

Table I lists 10 projects completed or terminated since the first grant award was made in March, 1962, up to June 30, 1965. In some cases, final reports on recently completed projects may not yet be available. Requests for final reports or additional information should be directed to the Project Director at the address shown.

Table II lists 55 projects currently being supported, and the completion date estimated by the grantee or tentatively recommended for support. Continued annual financing is dependent upon satisfactory project progress and Congressional appropriations.

The attached lists do not include projects funded only for the developmental phase and which were subsequently not consummated.
